

Essay issues

Of all types of creative work it is writing an essay is the most difficult and troublesome for students. This is due to the fact that in the text the author must express his own opinion on the problem under consideration. As a rule, students do not immediately begin to look for essay writer cheap and thus lose a lot of time. If while writing a control paper or essay it is enough just to list a few points of view of authoritative authors on this or that problem and interpret them, then when writing an essay students are required to present their own vision of the issue under consideration. The fact that an essay should formulate the author's own point of view, and presents the greatest problems when writing it. This problem is especially relevant for first-year students. In the early stages of their studies, students have their own view of a problem that has not yet been formed or is in the process of forming, so writing an essay presents certain difficulties.

The problem of a student justifying his or her own point of view is often accompanied by the problem of a mismatch between his or her vision and that of the instructor. For example, when writing an essay on the history of the Fatherland, the most acute, problematic periods of our history, which may be viewed and looked at differently by the teacher and the student due to established ideological attitudes, worldviews and other factors, are the topics. Such historical periods can safely include the Soviet period of history, the problematic periods of the reign of rulers such as Ivan the Terrible, Peter the Great and other issues.

When writing an essay, a student's point of view may not coincide with the teacher's point of view on the period in question, which sometimes creates problems for the student to pass the exam, get a positive result. Often students, knowing the instructor's preferences, "adjust" to the student's point of view to the detriment of their own position when writing an essay, show other types of conformism to achieve the desired result. This approach does not contribute to the proper formation of students' scientific mindset, so the correct, tolerant perception of students' individual points of view is essential to solving this problem.

It should be borne in mind that writing an essay requires not only the author's own point of view, but also the ability to formulate and justify it. Often, due to limited vocabulary, students' inability to formulate their thoughts, creative work becomes meaningless and unrelated text.

Many ambiguous questions arise in the design of the structure of the work. Often when writing an essay, teachers require a standard design with an introduction, the main part, and a conclusion. This is not always acceptable. An essay presupposes free expression of one's point of view in the form of a free composition, and it is not always possible to structure it according to the strict structure of writing.

As with other types of work, an essay is characterized by problems related to its design. Such problems include the inability of students to properly design footnotes and bibliography. To meet these conditions, it is enough to read the materials of the guidelines carefully.
